Listen and hear

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts acceptable to you, our Rock and Redeemer. Amen.

This is the 7<sup>th</sup> week of the season of "Epiphany". The season begins on the 12<sup>th</sup> day after Christmas to mark the revelation of Christ to the Gentiles. Epiphany refers to the manifestation of a deity – when God became human. It also refers to insightful moments. The moment when an important truth suddenly becomes clear. The moments that provide new spiritual insight, vision, or perspective. When we can re-interpret and re-think an issue to better understand it. This is an epiphany. We look at our teachings today in the book of Genesis and in the gospel of Luke. Both tell of the importance to see one another as loved children of God. How do we live in a way that responds with grace and kindness, instead of reacting to hurt with more hurt?

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In our reading from the book of Genesis, we find Joseph reveals his identity to his family. You may recall that Joseph had a difficult relationship with his brothers. Years ago the brothers had sold Joseph rather than kill him. He would become the dream interpreter for the Pharaoh and then became instrumental in running all of Egypt. We enter the story as Joseph reveals his identity to his brothers. They had assumed that he was dead and were astonished when he announced, "I am Joseph".

What happened to Joseph over those years might be seen as psychological, spiritual, and emotional growth. In his youth Joseph was an entitled young man. It would not be difficult to look at his family of origin to see how things went so wrong. Joseph was favoured by his father and lacked awareness of the impact on his siblings. His brothers wanted him gone. Joseph and his brothers were humbled by the challenges of life which brought them closer to their true, whole selves.

In looking back on his own life, Joseph discerned that God had woven his life together for good. He went through the dark night of the soul, where his attitude was shaped to see the divine at work and to find meaning in his life. When we are able to find meaning woven into the journey of our life, then we may be able to find shape and substance to living. This allows us to engage with others in a present and honest way. Joseph and his brothers were able to do this. It is helpful to remember the times where we were harsh, unforgiving, or indifferent with our children, our spouse or partner, our church community, our neighbors and colleagues. It is humbling to acknowledge our own faults. In these moments God invites us to receive divine compassion in our brokenness. Looking back, we may discover how God has been at work within us and among us. We become more aware of being offered strength and meaning for our present and the future. In the Genesis reading, Joseph's brothers have insight in the light of Joseph's compassion and they are able to embrace one another. Reconciliation begins within their relationships. The work of Archbishop Desmond Tutu, in the South African Truth and Reconciliation Commission, demonstrated the importance of reconciliation. The commission opened up a way to talk about the individual and systemic wrongs during 43 years of apartheid. Apartheid was a government-imposed system of discrimination and separation based on skin color. We continue to struggle with understanding healing and reconciliation in the church and in the larger society within Canada. The first residential schools opened in

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Canada in the 1870s. They were the product of churches and the government; a collective, calculated effort to eradicate Indigenous language and culture that the commission called a policy of cultural genocide. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission was formed as a means of reckoning with the devastating legacy of forced assimilation and abuse left by the residential school system. From 2008 to 2014, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission heard stories from thousands of residential school survivors. Reconciliation is a process of healing within relationships. This process requires public truth sharing, apology, and commemoration to acknowledge and redress past harms. It requires constructive action to address the impact of ongoing harm. Reconciliation seeks ways to address the ongoing legacies of colonialism.

Reconciliation requires that a new vision, based on a commitment to mutual respect, be developed. It also requires an understanding that the most harmful impacts of residential schools have been the loss children, the damage done to the pride and self-respect of Aboriginal people, and the lack of respect that non-Aboriginal people have held for their Aboriginal neighbours. The Aboriginal peoples continue to reach out in an effort to reconcile relationships between communities and nations. Reconciliation is not an Aboriginal problem; it is a Canadian problem.

In the gospel of Luke, we read about the Sermon on the Plain where Jesus called his listeners to love their enemies, to bless and to give even to those who curse and take. He teaches that we are to sow generosity where nothing is expected to grow. Jesus speaks to "you that listen". These are the people to whom Jesus has declared, "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God".

His commands seem to fly against common wisdom of that time and in our time. Jesus taught that gifts are freely given in relationship. This bond creates a desire to respond to the generosity of the other, not out of duty but out of desire to share with others.

The portion of this text that caused me to pause is the reference to the reward. For the measure you give will be the measure you get back." How do we understand this? This is not a prosperity gospel. It does not refer to financial wealth or earning our way into heaven. It is not a quid pro quo. This may be better understood in terms of the person we become in the process. Jesus provides the opportunity to experience a transforming grace. It is possible to be transformed when love is extended to our enemies. The shift in

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perspective allows us to experience a divine grace. A shift that takes the individual out of their own self and into the common good, the greater sense of the creation.

"Do to others as you would have them do to you," is not unique to Jesus or to the gospel of Luke. Matthew includes the rule. Philo, Homer, and others spoke of this. We are to treat others as we want to be treated. Our response to others is not based on their behavior, even with those who wrong us. How do we live in a way that responds with grace and kindness, instead of reacting to hurt with more hurt? We are encouraged to see the humanity within each of us. When we do so, we are able to recognize the complexity of our shared stories. We are able to see the mistakes that are made by others and by ourselves. This provides us with the ability to develop a gentleness, a kindness towards one another. Divine love transcends and conquers all when we surrender our pride and our sense of entitlement.

Jesus taught that we are to remember how God responds to us. "Be merciful," Jesus states, "just as God is merciful." Jesus reveals the merciful God. In him we see that the very nature of God is mercy and grace. We are provided with the image of a loving God and we are encouraged to live as a people to whom God has shown mercy. Praise be to God.
