The gardener

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts acceptable to you, our Rock and Redeemer. Amen.

In scripture, we discover that God works through ordinary people in extraordinary ways. God works through us, within us, and often despite of us. Events of the last few years have helped us to better understand how we hold an illusion of control over many aspects of life.

An image that comes to mind for me is that of my grandson with his toy recycle truck. It has different shapes that fit into the appropriate holes. He will attempt to push fit the triangle shape square hole and get frustrated that it won't fit. In some ways, this tendency to make it fit continues well into adulthood. We try to organize and control our lives and surroundings. Some even try to control the people in their lives. Perhaps the length of the pandemic has provided the opportunity to recognize the fragile nature of our plans.

Although the radical nature of God can be frightening, scripture teaches that we can trust God. Again and again the scriptures illustrate God's love and compassion through stories, the psalms, parables, and letters.

Everyday occurrences are presented in ways the catch our attention.

Our Lenten readings challenge our understanding our needs. Isaiah's words help us to accept God's offer of steadfast love within the covenantal relationship.

Isaiah declares, "Everyone who thirsts, come to the waters." Water is essential to life, yet it is often overlooked. It is surprising how many people do not take care to simply drink sufficient

water each day. A lack of water will affect our cognitive and physical well being. Isaiah points toward meeting the collective needs of humanity.

Paul's letter to the church in Corinth warned against temptation and idolatry. Idolatry is the worship of an earthly good as if it were divine. Paul spoke of ancestors protected and nurtured by God. When they accepted leadership from Moses they were led from oppression in Egypt into the wilderness. They consumed spiritual food and spiritual drink, yet, many failed to appreciate and worship God. They yearned for the familiarity of the past as they failed to remember the horror of slavery.

We are encouraged to see that life goes beyond the immediate individual need when we hear how Jesus preached about the transformation of the world. Those who have ears to hear are called to repent or experience God's judgment. Jesus spoke to misconceptions held by his listeners when he responded to those who told him of a terrible tragedy. They were pointing to the faults of those who had been tortured, blaming their sinful behaviour. This follows the faulty reasoning that pain and sickness were signs of being punished by God for their sins or for sins of their ancestors. You may recall similar arguments in the story of Job. Friends and family were skeptical of Job's innocence when he was in anguish. The disciples confronted with similar questions as they struggled to understand his ministry of healing and forgiveness. It seems that people want to have a definitive reason for most things.

Jesus spoke bluntly against this misunderstanding when he said, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans, because they suffered? I tell you, no." He then shared the parable about a gardener and a fig tree. The allegory may be understood literally— the "three years" could represent the time of Jesus' ministry and the tree as the Jewish nation. Or, perhaps we could see the fig tree as reflecting the apathy and indecision among those who hear the gospel message. The gardener was determined to care for a fruitless fig tree because he was open to a future possibilities. We are able to reflect on how this story fits in our life. Perhaps we might consider what needs special tending? What will cultivate the "soil" of daily life so new growth and new possibilities might emerge? This text seems so appropriate for a week when spring has become so evident. The birds are singing and the bulbs began to poke through the soil as the snow melted away.

In closingthe parable of the fig tree can helps us embrace the divine mystery and recognize what is out of our control. Much is unknown. Questions remain unanswered. The future is God's.

Yet, we are able to share in the mission as the future unfolds.
