Freedom

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

How do you receive the news? Do you listen to the radio, watch tv news, or read the newspaper? The news has been bleak with war, mass shootings, human rights issues, economic uncertainty, and major social issues. The struggle for freedom persists. The people of Ukraine are fighting for freedom from an invading country. The people of Afghanistan are struggling against internal and external threats. The Americans struggle to understand where freedom exists with the use of firearms and reproductive rights. Canadians have struggled with issues of freedom, specifically freedom of speech and freedom of choice. Presbyterians have struggled to understand freedom in issues around human sexuality and inclusivity within our polity and our congregations. Individuals seek freedom from addiction. Freedom is a complicated concept.

The definition of freedom is the ability to do, say, and think without constraint. This, of course, leads to the rights and responsibilities of freedom in its many forms. Freedom of speech, freedom of thought, freedom from persecution and injustice. There is the responsibility to recognize the rights of all involved. Freedom of speech must not restrict

the freedoms of others. A few years ago we prepared for the possible disruption of our worship services by individuals who believe the pulpit should exclude women. We recognize that they have the freedom to hold that opinion, however, their actions could restrict our freedom of worship. The potential issue was discussed and a response was developed. The initial concerns diminished when we worked together to better understood the issues.

In the gospels and epistles we discover that Christ has set us free. In Christ, freedom is rooted in and flourishes within our love of God and neighbour. Paul emphasized the work of the Holy Spirit in community—the binding together of faithful people to create new community as the body of Christ. We enter into the epistle as Paul speaks to a specific situation. After he had left Galatia, other teachers preached the need to follow the traditional law as a form of obedience in their newfound faith in Christ. The letter draws attention to issues around food practices and circumcision. The 'other' teachers claimed that the law is God's Spirit. The law, according to Paul, is a guide, a path toward justice. God breaks into our awareness by providing the fruits of the Spirit—love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. The Spirit transforms people into a new creation—into people who are more loving, gentle, and kind. It is more than physical modification or the food that they eat. Their transformation is holistic.

Paul suggests that those who are free will make themselves slaves to one another. This is not oppressive slavery or indentured bondage. This freedom to serve one another is not based on a political, economic, or cultural system. It is the process of stepping away from the hierarchy of relationships and political agendas, stepping back from a focus on self interest, and stepping into the creation of relationships created with the gifts of the Spirit. It is in discovering the ways of Christ and the faithful love of God that we respond in love. We are loved and we love freely. Paul urged the Galatians to rely on the Spirit for the gifts of love, joy, peace, patience, gentleness, and self-control.

We are to use these gifts when we become involved in our community of faith and develop relationships with one another. In part, we gather in our faith community each week to seek reinforcement of our need to love God and neighbour. Our time in prayer and worship feeds us and encourages us to follow in the ways of Christ. In response to

the challenges posed by individuals and relationships, Carol Holtz-Martin wrote, "There are times when we encounter the sandpaper of fellow congregants' wearisome ways against the rough edges of our own unholiness. That call impels us to prepare our hearts for worship, so that we must be fed or know sharp hunger; to exist in community with such openness and generosity that our neighbor's well-being is part and parcel to our own." Do you recall a moment when a decision to seek peace allowed you to deepen a relationship rather than allow harm to continue? Consider the times when you chose to approach a difficult situation from a perspective of gentleness, love, and peace rather than cynicism and judgement.

The freedom offered in Christ flows through the fruit we bear. We have been set free to serve one another in love. We reach out with patient kindness to understand the difficulties faced by our neighbours. One way to learn about such difficulties and significant social issues is through the Presbyterian Church Social Action Spotlight. The current spotlight relates to the opioid crisis. Are you aware that Canada has the second highest rate of opioid use per capita? Between 2016 and 2021, more than 26,000 people in Canada died from opioid-related overdose. During the pandemic there were record numbers of opioid-related deaths and hospitalizations. The General Assembly in 2018 concluded that: "Responses to the opioid crisis need to remove shame and [stigma] and address the suffering of people, caused by numerous factors that are often beyond the control of any one person, community or level of government and will only be effectively addressed when all parties work together to respond to a multi-faceted public health crisis" (A&P 2018, p. 352)." What can we do to respond to the issue of addiction? We can engage in discussions to learn more about the issues. We can pray...seeking God's direction. We can be open to the gifts of the Spirit as we walk with people who struggle with addiction.

In closing, I urge you to consider an interesting question posed by Carla Works, Professor of New Testament, "So how will the Galatians know that they are indeed a people being transformed—a people of the promise, children of God, clothed in Christ? ... Because they are a people who bear one another's burdens, love one another, as Christ has loved them. They are a people whose actions are marked by the shape of the cross rather than their own selfish desires. They are fulfilling the intention of the law—to love their neighbors."

Her question may be one that lingers with us. How do we know when we are following in the ways of Christ? Paul wrote that the law was fulfilled by Christ by the ways in which he embodied the love of neighbor. "For the whole law is fulfilled with, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.'" This is the new creation of God, to work together for the good of one another. To recognize that our interests are intricately linked with our neighbour ... our neighbours living beside us, our neighbours across town, and our neighbours throughout the world. Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
