Message

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

Theologian John of Damascus (675-750 AD) may have been the first to describe the Trinity relationship as perichoresis, derived from Greek, which means moving or dancing around. For John, perichoresis meant that God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit are interdwelling; each separate from the other and within the other. John of Damascus, in his description of perichoresis, illustrates the dynamic unity of the Trinity. In this Triune relationship of love and self-giving community space is created. The Trinity helps us to understand the importance of relationship as the heart of the church.

C. S. Lewis wrote, "the whole dance of this three-person life is to be played out in each one of us". The dance metaphor may help us to understand faithful living. When we think in terms of dancing with a partner there is an invitation, then initial steps become a flow of movement around a dance floor. There is a leader and a follower working to create harmonized movement. The partners enhance each other's efforts and the movement becomes unified. In a similar way, God invites us to join in perichoresis. This dance of faith draws us together with God, our relationships are harmonized, and all works toward the glory and peace of God.

Paul wrote of peace with God, a peace that develops through our faith in God and our belief in God's promises. He goes on to describe how this peace provides resilience and strength in our deepest vulnerability with an intentional connection with God. This connection need not be complicated. It can be setting time aside to pray each day. Pausing to acknowledge God's presence in your life and taking that moment to breathe in your heightened awareness of the divine. Many in this congregation intentionally include being of service as part of their connection with God. Relationship building with family and friends illustrates one of our deepest connections with the divine.

In writing of peace, Paul acknowledged the many challenges the reader would face and encouraged them to develop this abiding sense of the presence of God. The more God is deeply connected within our lives, especially during times of trouble, the stronger our

hope and faith become. Even in the midst of chaos we will sense the presence of the Spirit. We will be held within the strength and nurture of the triune God who gave us the Holy Spirit to fill our hearts with love.

In writing to the Romans, Paul described their relationship to God in contrast to the oppression they lived within. He encouraged the reader to see their lives in a different way. Paul tells them to throw off the shame they endured around their faith and circumstance ... and to take a stand, to boast of their hope and of their suffering. They are to hold tight to the honour of faith in God and God's love for them. You may hear the words of Isaiah, "Do not fear, for you will not be ashamed; do not be discouraged, for you will not suffer disgrace" (Isa. 54:4). Paul reframed the social dishonor experienced by the church. They are to embrace the resilient hope that emerges out of suffering.

Peter L. Steinke wrote, "We 'waste' suffering if we gloss over, deny, avoid, or neglect its message. ... If, however, we can learn from pain it is not wasted but a source of life and health." Paul's letters are written through his experience of faith, hope, suffering, and love. He developed deep insight into his suffering with the realization that denial and avoidance are a waste.

Hope can be found and shared in the midst of pain and suffering. We see evidence of hope held in the journeys of all who have struggled. There are significant people throughout history who have held hope as they struggled in the journey to fight oppression, fear, poverty, and discrimination. The work of Mother Teresa as she worked among the poor and gathered resources from the wealthy. A former president of India wrote, "In our present-day troubled world, incessantly plagued by conflict and hatred, the life that is lived and the work that is carried out by people like Mother Teresa bring new hope for the future of mankind." In the second world war, Winston Churchill provided hope to a nation by identifying the grim reality they faced and his hope to build on their strengths to reach their goals. Franklin D. Roosevelt rallied the nation by sustaining hope as the country moved through the depression. And, each of us knows of the importance of hope. The deep hope of faith developed through endurance in living with pain and suffering, our own or that of others. Hope is something we take in. "And hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us" (5:5). Our faith, our resiliency, and God's love are the

substance of hope. Paul wrote, "Faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love" (1 Cor. 13:13). We do not earn God's love for it is freely given to all who will accept it. Paul encourages the reader to be faithful knowing that God is faithful. The love of God lives among us through the Spirit.

Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
