May God bless our understanding of this, God’s holy word. **The word of the Lord.**

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

I am intrigued by the weekly readings as we follow the Revised Common Lectionary. You are encouraged to explore the readings during the week in anticipation of our worship service each Sunday. They are included in the bulletin for the current week and for the next week. At first glance the readings may appear to be a chaotic mix of scripture from different sections of the bible. Yet, they all have the common theme of sharing the diverse stories of people of faith. The bible shares their journeys, a journey from birth to re-birth, from partial life to abundant life. Their stories provide a witness to God’s love and compassion. It is about the transforming power of God at work, moving us into the fullness of life, here and now.

There was an unexpected gift for me in becoming a minister. Paul speaks to this gift in his letter to the people of Colossae. After introducing himself and Timothy, Paul goes on to write, “In our prayers for you we always thank God” ... In our prayers for you. I remember praying as a little girl. I seem to recall that it was when I was young that I discovered the gift in praying for others. You may recall the first prayer that I learned. It started like this, Now I lay me down to sleep, I pray the Lord my soul to keep. In my

prayers, it always ended with, God keep my sister and brothers and especially my Mom safe ... and then the list of people and pets would go on for as long as I stayed awake. So, when I was in the process of becoming a minister I knew that prayer would be important. The unexpected piece developed around keeping people in prayer.

I have discovered that a very special space is created when I ask someone if I can keep them in prayer and when I ask if their names can be mentioned in the prayers of the people during our worship service. This sacred space is held as people consider my request. There is really no other way to describe how the air literally shifts within our conversation. Many of you are familiar with this request and for some you are very familiar with this sacred space. You are familiar because it is a space that you enter into during your daily life. It is a sacred space where you hold your conversations with God. It is a space where you behold all that God provides and it moves you to tears of joy and gratitude. It is a space where the horror of the world bumps up against and you feel the presence of God with you.

Yet, there are many who are not familiar with this space. It is a surprising space for them, this sacred moment of holding room for others. Their faces will soften, and if they are able to stay in the moment, there is a deeper breath that is drawn into their aching hearts. Initially my efforts were centered on the prayers of the people on Sunday where people are named and many who wish to remain unnamed. With a growing number of people and situations I was presented with a bit of a dilemma. To ensure I held them in prayer I started a list. It became an evolving list of people who ask for prayer, people who are in need, and for those who I sense are in need of extra care. Time is set aside each day to hold space for each of them, to hold them with me in my prayers with God.

This week the scriptures speak to the importance of loving God and neighbour with prayer and the image of the plumb line. Are you familiar with a plumb line? It is a tool used to measure a straight line and determine whether the line is true. A simple example would be hanging a picture with two hooks on the back. The line between the hooks must be straight or the picture will be hanging on an angle. The original tool involved a weight on a string that hung straight without turning when the line was balanced. Now our modern tools include levels and electronic lasers. (hold up level) When the level is off center the bubble floats to one side or the other. The bubble needs to be centred in the middle for it

to be level. Regardless of the tool used, the plumb line represents congruity in a structure. In this context in the reading from Amos, the metaphor of the plumb line measuring a faulty wall illustrates a flaw in the community's structure. The people had wandered away from God and social justice. They were no longer following the laws put down by God. Amos cried out against the systemic exploitation of the powerless and the humiliation of the lowly. He denounced religion that masked injustice. He raged against the justification of social sin. In speeches and sermons, Martin Luther King would proclaim, "Let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream". King drew attention to systemic racism rooted in the political economy that was indifferent to the poor. We tend to think of judgment in a negative way. Can God be both a judging and loving, gracious God. The biblical judge made judgments actively seeking justice to set things right. We affirm in the Apostles' Creed that one day the Lord "shall come to judge the quick and the dead." This God who comes to us as a seeking shepherd, as a woman searching, and as a loving judge seeks to set things right. The metaphor that a faulty structure must be destroyed leads to the conclusion that Israel's faulty structure will lead to its destruction. The people of Israel will be shattered because they have turned away from the goodness of God.

In the parable of the traveller left at the side of the road, Jesus expands our understanding of our neighbour. It is a familiar story for many of you. Sometimes that sense of familiarity can lose some of the complexity and richer details. It is a story of connection and community. A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, from David's city of peace, perched high on a hill, twenty miles through the wilderness, to Jericho, which is located at the edge of the Dead Sea. On this dangerous road the traveller was attacked by robbers, stripped of everything, brutally beaten, and left for dead. Jesus told of three people who noticed him on the side of the road. First a priest, then a Levite, and both crossed the road to avoid him. When the Samaritan came upon the traveller he was moved by compassion to clean his wounds and care for the man. The Samaritan was living fully in his truth of loving his neighbour. We do not know how the Samaritan developed his sense of mercy. A sense of mercy and compassion often develops as we discover more about ourselves and others. The ancient listeners of this story would recognize that the man filled with compassion, the real neighbor, was a

foreigner of a different faith. The lawyer, an expert in the law broke through religious legality by naming kindness as the true mark of the neighbor. The kindness appeared from an unexpected source and the readers expectations were shattered. Perhaps this is when the fruits by which we are known become more obvious and conspicuous—genuine goodness and authentic respect held for all creation. Douglas John Hall, a Canadian theologian, asks what it might mean to believe that our capacity for compassion was prodded by the divine. Imagine a transcendent Voice whispering in our ears, "For God's sake ... be kind!" Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
