May God bless our understanding of this, God's holy word. The word of the Lord.

Message

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

The scriptures tell of journeys through the wilderness and the darkness. A wilderness without maps or landmarks. A time without the comfort of familiar surroundings, familiar structures, and the comfort of regular routines. A time of transition that alters the structure of individual lives and communities in that time and for centuries to follow. The readings speak of transfiguration as we approach the season of Lent. Lent, a time set aside to seek inner transformation. A time to face our fears and overcome temptation. It is a time to seek an understanding of our living God, our faith, and our place within creation.

Our lives are transformed by the love of God. The scriptures help us to recognize the ways in which faith has affected others and allows us to understand the ways in which our faith impacts our lives. Seven long weeks after they left Egypt the Israelites arrived at Sinai. They were at the beginning of a difficult transition and in the wilderness. Where is the actual Mount Sinai located. If you could find a white edged bible and look to the back

pages to find the map marked #1. This map takes a slightly different perspective. You will see the Great Sea at the far left with Egypt at the bottom, then the regions of Sinai in the middle, Midian at the top right, Edom, and Moab sits at the top left. Look towards the right edge of the page. You will find Mount Sinai between the red S and T. You will also see the question mark beside the name.

Mount Sinai is the location where Moses received the 10 commandments. The other biblical mention of Mount Sinai is in the book of Kings1 when several hundred years later, Elijah the prophet fled from queen Jezebel. He hid in a cave on the mountain of Horeb, which is also known as Mount Sinai. It was there that the word of God came to him. You may recall that Elijah was told that God was not in the great noises and rumbling earthquakes. God is found in our quiet, humble day-to-day actions. Elijah was told to go back to the people and to do his work.

We know of these two significant events on Mount Sinai, yet they have not clearly marked the holy place. The Talmud, the historical debates and writings of the Rabbis, explain that it is not the place that provides honour but the person who honors the place. When God was on the mountain, the place was holy. What was done there was holy but the place is not inherently holy.

You may recall some of the story about Moses from when he was a child in the reeds by the river Nile. Moses was brought up in Pharaoh's court in Egypt, where he was privileged and set apart from his people. Moses recognized the injustice and was angered by the oppression of the Hebrew people. When he witnessed an Egyptian beating a Hebrew slave, Moses killed the Egyptian and fled. He went to Midian where he became a shepherd. It was there that God spoke from a burning bush and called him to a higher purpose. He went back to Egypt with the purpose of freeing slaves from bondage. Yet, Moses hesitated. I am pretty sure that we can all understand his hesitation. Moses was hesitant to go back and take on a leadership role. God reassured him that others would help and that his brother Aaron could speak for him. Scripture tells of the many ways in which God helped. The plagues in Egypt, the crossing of the Red Sea, the gifts of manna & quail, and water from a rock in the desert ... all signs that God was leading the people. Signs that Moses and the people were not alone. In his story, we discover a courageous and a flawed man. We discover a person who struggled with the frustrations

of working with a fearful and reactionary people. In their fear they turned away from God and the leadership provided. God was faithful. God led them, fed them, and stayed with them even when they lost hope. God called them to walk in the way and provided leaders to guide them. Which is where we enter into the story today. God told Moses he would receive the tablets of stone, with the law and the commandments. When the Torah – the stone tablets- was received on Mount Sinai, they continued their journey to the Land of Israel.

Gregory of Nyssa, in the 4th century, recognized the revelation of God on the mountain as transfiguration, a moment in which life is changed and transformed.

The story is set in series of contrasts. As we read through the history of Exodus, we discover the power of God in contrast with the issues of the people; the light and the dark, the awesome with the ordinary, the breathtaking along side the tedious. Perhaps this is how God catches our attention. Each of us know the impact of seeing a familiar face, feeling the touch of a hand on our shoulder, when we are in the depth of despair. In difficult times our faith offers the deep reassurance of God's love and faithfulness. When the struggle is great and the darkness seems overwhelming it is good to lean into the faith and assurance offered by others.

A few years ago, on a Sunday morning when I was preaching here in Bayfield, I received news that my mother was in the hospital. Following the service I headed back to Kitchener to join with my family. While I was visiting I went in search of a coffee. A man started talking with me as I walked down a hallway. He had noticed my clerical collar and needed to talk. He was struggling with the impact of a family member's illness. In that moment he found comfort and support with me sharing my faith.

The readings take us into a time when people were struggling in their faith journeys. In both Exodus and Matthew the people are becoming acquainted with God in new ways. Moses met with God in the darkness of a cloud on Mount Sinai as 600,000 former slaves waited below. In the gospel of Matthew, the disciples bore witness to the transfiguration as they made their way toward the confusing and terrifying crucifixion. Moses and Jesus experienced transfiguration on their challenging journeys.

Moses was changed in many ways. Even his physical appearance changed – when he left the mountain and returned to the people, his face was shining. Aaron and the others

realized that Moses has been in the presence of the divine God. They experienced holy fear of God. The "fear" was an exalted, reverential sense of awe. To fear God is to stand in awe of God's majesty, power, wisdom, justice, and mercy. We humble ourselves and adore God. It may be easier to comprehend when we think in terms of being in awe of God.

The author C. S. Lewis, in the Chronicles of Narnia, retells the story of the life, death and resurrection of Christ with fictional characters. In doing so, Lewis allows the reader to suspend disbelief as they become immersed in the story. In the book, Aslan shared a message, "Here on the mountain I have spoken to you clearly. I will not often do so down in Narnia. Here on the mountain, the air is clear and your mind is clear; as you drop down into Narnia, the air will thicken. Take great care that it does not confuse your mind. And the signs which you have learned here will not look at all as you expect them to look, when you meet them there. That is why it is so important to know them by heart and pay no attention to appearance. Remember the signs and believe the signs. Nothing else matters."

In the gospel reading the disciples were growing aware of the signs and becoming more familiar with fear. Jesus had just predicted his coming death and they were grappling with this new reality. In this passage, Jesus went up the mountain with Peter, James, and John.

The transfiguration is a paradox. There was nothing the disciples could do to prevent the suffering that would unfold for Jesus or for themselves. In a similar way, there was really nothing that they could do to shield themselves from the light of God. The intensity of that light initially frightened them and that fear sifted to awe and reverences as God's hope lingered with them in their darkest moments. The transformational experience on that mountain prepared them for the continuation of their sacred journey. Not everyone is blessed with moments of clarity provided by a transcendent experience. Yet, many of you have experienced challenges that prepared you for major transitions within your life. Such experiences shape how we see the world and how we live with one another. Such encounters allow us to remember the signs.

In her sermon at the Festival of Homiletics, Barbara Brown Taylor shared, "But here's the thing about that cloud of unknowing, which even the saints take on trust: it's not there to

get through, like a test or a fever. It is God's home. It is the place where God dwells. To be invited in is a great honor, and to stay a while? Better yet. Those who come out can be hard to look at, at first—where did all that brightness come from, inside that dark cloud?—and they may not have a lot of words to describe where they have been, but even the limping ones will tell you this: they would never have chosen it, not in a million years. But now that it has happened? They would never give it back. "

Through the centuries, the message of the transfiguration has continued to point us toward God. The one God who is present with us as we experience sorrow and darkness. The light of God continues to shine on our journey that takes us through the darkness and the wilderness. God finds us in our homes, in our work, in our communities. God finds us when our hearts are broken and when we experience joy. God finds us when we run away and when we are in the midst of the deepest darkness. The glimmer of Christ's light will show the way. Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
