With the money she saved, Gauri was able to further her child's education and stock her tailoring shop with more materials. Together, we are making a difference.

Remember to include all the providers and recipients of this service in your prayers.

4<sup>th</sup> Sunday Lent March 19 **Readings**: 1Samuel 16:1–13; Psalm 23; Ephesians 5:8–14; John 9:1–41

March 19 – Mission Moment Hawa Issifu lives in Ghana with her husband. Hawa became ill with a disease that caused damage to her spinal cord. Her husband explored searched for a remedy but found none. Then, Hawa registered at the Garu Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) Centre. With the support of PWS&D, the CBR program provided Hawa with a tricycle and wheelchair, plus business training and access to start-up capital for a small business. This helped Hawa's mobility and with her business expanding there are new opportunities for her family. Together, we are making a difference.

**Reflection:** Samuel is told that God does not look upon outward appearances but looks upon the heart. Then God chose David, the youngest son of Jesse, to be Israel's next king. We know that as he grew life became very challenging. He was a mixture of great courage and faithfulness—and great sin and failure. What do you suppose God saw and loved in David's heart? What do you think God loves when God looks upon your own heart?
