Message

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

Early on the first day of the week, the disciples went to the tomb where he had been buried. They found the stone rolled away and the tomb was empty. Friends, we gather here as Christ's disciples, on the first day of the week, to celebrate the good news of the gospel: Jesus Christ has risen from the dead!

Swiss theological giant Karl Barth said that what brings people to worship—not just on Easter, but any day—is an unspoken question clinging to their hearts and minds, and that question ... "Is it true?" Is it true that God lives and gives us life? Is it true that God established the laws of nature, and God raised Jesus from the dead? Is it true that the extra-ordinary happened on that morning <u>and</u> that we can only rebuild our lives on its foundation? There is something in the Easter story that reaches the deepest part of our hearts and minds, where both doubt and faith are found. In the resurrection God gave us such a miracle of love and forgiveness ... it is worthy of faith and somehow stirs doubt.

Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24 [B#565/W#625]

In this morning's psalm ... the psalmist is filled with a sense of joy grounded in gratitude. It is a song of deliverance, with a theme that is both ancient and current. Today this psalm helps as we look to the many challenges facing our communities of faith. The psalmist wants us to know that God provides the transformative power of divine grace to live in us and in this world.

God's mysterious power embraces us and sets us on a path in life. The term metanoia describes a new understanding, a shift in perspective. A new way of understanding that we are accountable for living in a transformed way. It is a shift in focus, a shift away from that which serves the individual personal gain. We are turned outward - to serve others, to serve God...and in doing so, we are freed from ourselves. We find ourselves turned from inward-serving to outward-serving. In doing so, we discover that we share our hope with others.

In our reading from the book of Acts, the apostle Peter realized an essential truth that creates a struggle for many people ... God does <u>not</u> show partiality or favor.

Acts 10:34-43 [B#129/W#134]

God offers restoration and salvation to all people. For Peter, this is a new understanding and it continues to be surprising for many. We discover that this universal love of all people is present throughout the scriptures. God's covenant with Abraham includes a promise of God's blessing to all nations.

The news of God's impartial love extends out to us, for we are called to love as God loves. This divinely inspired love is the focus of the "good news of peace through Jesus Christ" evident throughout the books and letters of the New Testament. This message reaches out to us from the gospel of John when Mary Magdalene finds the tomb empty with its stone rolled away.

John 20:1-18 [B#114/W#119]

Mary ran to share the news. There is a sense of urgency. When the beloved disciple heard the news, he raced to the tomb with Peter. This is the same disciple who stayed to the end of the crucifixion. We know people like this today, indeed, the church needs this to thrive. The people who see potential and possibility where others see barriers, damage, and more work. Although the optimism can be challenging, we may secretly

cheer for them and draw strength for our faith journeys. They seem to have an unwavering trust that God will provide goodness, even out of a crucifixion.

Peter had just spent the last few days running away from Jesus. Here he ran toward the possibility ... perhaps with hopeful anticipation. He had been with the other disciples when Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead. Could it be possible that the same thing happened with Jesus?

Many of us live with Peter in these complex, conflicting emotions. We promise ourselves that we will not fall away from whatever God has given us to do, but when we are threatened or face significant obstacles, we question our faith. Our memory holds the remarkable and life-giving moments that nourish our faith and we run to see if it might happen again. We are eager for new life even with conflicting thoughts and emotions.

In "Surviving Crucifixion" Barbara Brown Taylor wrote, "The truth of the matter, for me, is that resurrection is nothing any of us has ever seen or experienced for ourselves. Near-death experiences, yes; ghostly visitations, yes; but none of us knows firsthand what it is like to be resurrected from the dead." She continues with, "According to the Bible, God set it up that way. Hundreds of people witnessed Jesus' crucifixion, but not one living soul was there when he was raised from the dead. The women saw him afterward, when he was back on his feet, and his disciples saw him after that, although not for long, but no one was allowed the privilege of seeing him come back to life. So none of us should feel too badly about finding it hard to believe. Resurrection is not something we can test, like gravity or true north."

John wrote that when Mary returned to the tomb to mourn the loss of Jesus, two angels spoke to her from the tomb. When she turned from them, she found the gardener beside her. Mary looked at the gardener, listened to him, and did not recognize him. Then, with her back to him, he spoke her name. The sound of his voice helped her to see him. He spoke her name. I wonder how we might be like Mary. We long to be known by God—to be held in God's gaze, to be seen as the object of God's love and care. We want to be seen for who we are in our lives, our bodies, our histories, our dreams, and our losses. When Jesus said, "Mary," his words travel toward the spiritual, emotional, and physical aspects of her. We hear Christ when he speaks to us through her. God comes to

us in the deeply personal way by speaking of our name. Jesus comes to us as a presence that reaches beyond our intellectual knowing. He touches our lives in ways we cannot see.

What does this mean? In part, that we are called to recognize that Jesus comes to us through our senses. We nurture this connection when we join with others in faith. It is within community that the physical, emotional, and communal aspects are experienced. It is in the taste of communion elements, in the familiar hymn that stirs us, in the feel of the Bible and the hymnal in our hands, and with the support given and received.

Jesus appointed Mary to go out and tell others what she has experienced. Although she wanted to stay with him, Mary obeyed the risen Christ. She went out from the garden and told the other disciples what had happened. Jesus the Christ had risen. Mary went out to live in His way and to share what she knew to be true. We continue her work today in the ways in which we follow in the ways of Christ. Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.

God of hope, we ask you to linger with all who are dealing with health challenges: Brian; Stephani, Judith & Gerry; Carter, Jim & family; Rob, Valerie, Jim & Jane; Carl; Betty Lou; Ruth; Rudy, Audrey, & Grace; and, Warren & Lori.

We lift up all who are on our hearts as they face immense challenges. O God of hope and new possibility, in Christ you opened the way into the future for us through the power of your redeeming love.
