Messengers

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

The scriptures share the many stories of people who discover their purpose within God's creation and the ways in which they respond to God's call. Stories that tell us that from the beginning of time God has reached out to individuals and to entire communities. Stories of people who have been reluctant, afraid, confused, eager and willing. The scriptures share the diverse experiences of the people across time. The Psalmist wrote, 'For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations.' The book of Exodus tells of Moses leading a reluctant and frightened people away from brutal slavery in Egypt into the wilderness toward the promised land. The gospel of Matthew tells of Jesus sending the apostles into the wilderness to share their faith 'like sheep into the midst of wolves'. In the letter to the Romans, Paul wrote of the resiliency that develops when "endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us."

During the exodus the Israelites travelled through the desert. They did not hesitate to complain about the living conditions and the lack of food and water. In our passage today,

the Israelites have travelled from Rephidim where they questioned God and Moses. It was a place where people wondered if God knew what God was doing and whether they could trust the leadership of Moses. The Jewish Virtual Library describes Rephidim as "a place of both pain and provision. The people were called to move beyond both the memory of the pain and the security of the provision. They were to move on to new experiences, new challenges, and new revelation. They were to move on carrying with them the lessons of history, the lessons of Rephidim. In their life as the people of God, they would be asked to remember these lessons." And, God provided for their needs as they continued their journey to Mount Sinai.

Exodus 19:1-8a [B#65/W#72]

Moses went up to the mountain where he heard God's instruction. God spoke to Moses. Moses spoke to the people. The people were chosen by God<u>if</u> they obeyed and kept the covenant. How do we define our covenant with God? The congregational mission statement that drew me to this congregation provides a wonderful description of your faith commitment: Alive by the Breath of God in worship, nurture, outreach, and mission. We are made alive by our commitment to our faith. In living out our purpose within God's creation. Keeping these promises in mind, we gather in community to be fed spiritually as we live our lives in service to God's creation.

The stories of scripture have been dramatized in many different ways. I have just started to watch The Chosen, a series which conflates the gospel stories. It begins with the statement that the series is based on the true stories of the gospels with some locations and timelines combined or condensed. Backstories and some characters and dialogue have been added for dramatic purposes. I heard about the series from several people and you may find the adaption interesting. The series depicts Matthew, also known as Levi, was a tax collector who is troubled by his profession and his place in the culture. Matthew will be called to be one of the disciples and will provide the image of Jesus as a shepherd caring for his sheep.

Matthew 9:35-10:8 (9-23) [B#9 /W#10]

In this passage Jesus selected twelve apostles from his followers, which symbolically represents the twelve tribes of Israel. The apostles were sent out to continue his work. Jesus told them, "See, I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves". This

echoes the warning he gives his disciples in the Sermon on the Mount when he said, "Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves". The prophet Ezekiel condemned "the shepherds of Israel" who abused, oppressed, and scattered many of the Jewish people, creating sheep without a shepherd. Jesus comes as a shepherd to rescue the lost and scattered sheep of Israel. Matthew's gospel is the only one with the specific instruction to go only to the people of Israel. This restriction would be removed by the resurrected Jesus, when he commanded the disciples, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations.

The apostles' will proclaim a message which follows that of John the Baptist and Jesus for they were instructed to preach the good news that God's kingdom has arrived - the deliverance of the oppressed—the sick being cured, the dead being raised, lepers being cleansed, and demons being cast out.

The imperfect, human apostles were commissioned to do service in the world. The good Shepherd empowered and equipped them. The Gospel stories remind us that we are called to do live out our faith and follow in the ways of Christ. We will likely not solve the problems of the world. We will not meet the needs of all people. We are called to do our part, as God calls us and prepares us to do so. God does not leave the church alone in her mission but equips the saints for ministry in the world. When there is need, Jesus shows compassion and sends out his followers to serve those in need. God provides the way to serve and the Spirit will guide us to meet the diverse needs of this world with compassion. Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
