Message

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

This passage reminds us to reach out with compassionate welcome with one another. This includes people who are known to us and those who are not. This includes those who are easy to get along with and others who are more difficult, perhaps even abrasive. Shared hospitality allows us to experience new insight when our stories are shared. This may help us to develop deeper understanding of the counter cultural message of the gospels. Jeremiah faced hostility and rejection from his people when he spoke the prophetic message against the actions of Jerusalem. The prophet struggled with the realities of a prophet who was not welcomed by the people of Jerusalem. Jeremiah's prophetic task took him to the edge of despair. It was there that he discovered the depth of God's loving grace. Today's passage took place during the reign of Judah's last king. Zedekiah, the third son of Josiah, had been set on the throne by Nebuchadnezzar after the Babylonian armies took Jerusalem in 597 BCE. King Zedekiah replaced his nephew, Jehoiachin, who was deported to Babylon with other officials and warriors. Zedekiah would be responsible for maintaining order and collecting annual tribute for his Babylonian overlords.

In this midst of this upheaval Jeremiah, with his self-imposed "yoke of straps and bars" around his neck, called the people to be centered in God alone. The yoke symbolically connected Jeremiah to King Nebuchadnezzar and the Babylonian army, for they were being used to change the hearts and wills of God's people. Relentlessly, Jeremiah urged the people to repent-to turn and look around- and return to YHWH. He prayed for transformation within God's people as he warned against denying the reality of God's truth. DM Bailey shared an impactful quote, "There are two great pathologies in our culture today. One of them is denial. The only antidote for denial is radical truth-telling. The other great pathology is despair. The only antidote for despair is radical hope, grounded in community." Jeremiah shared his message of hope rooted in the truth of the prophetic message to look to God for salvation.

How do we welcome the teachings of Christ? In her commentary, Diana Butler Bass wrote, "When Christians think of Jesus and welcoming, we usually think of "I was a stranger and you welcomed me." We position ourselves as the host in the exchange, the one who opens the door. But today's text "whoever welcomes you welcomes me" places us in the story differently — we are the stranger, a potential guest, not the host. That makes this gospel reading a bit harder to take. We might enjoy welcoming, but perhaps feel awkward being welcomed."

Compassionate welcome means approaching each other through God. This is how genuine relationships emerge within the grace-filled hospitality of God's love. God's hospitality teaches us that close, loving, enduring relationships are to be valued along with distant, occasional, and abrasive ones.

Although Jesus speaks of rewards in this passage, it is not the expectation that something will be returned to us. Love is not always met with love. Jesus is clear with his disciples that being his followers will be difficult at times and that they will suffer persecution. Hospitable welcome is rooted in spiritual discipline. We discover that by offering and receiving hospitality we are able to welcome the new, unfamiliar, and unknown into our lives. In doing so we may discover the diversity of God's gifts within people. We are encouraged to open our hearts and souls along with our worldviews and perspectives. Jesus describes the love that families hold for one another, the tenderness with which we care for parents and for children. That tenderness and compassion is the structure into

which we welcome others in Christ's name. When we welcome the stranger, we welcome the Christ. When we extend hospitality to others, we hear new stories of faith that enrich our perceptions and develop new insight.

In his commentary William Goettler wrote, 'now Jesus arrives and says, "Take that love for family, that love for your closest community, and extend it, extend it further and further still. Welcome in the stranger. Welcome in the one whose life you hardly understand. Not to change them, but simply because they too are God's." In closing, we are encouraged by Jeremiah and Jesus to turn toward God for direction. In living out the ways of Christ we take our love of God and extend that to our family, our community, and then extend that love further still. We are to welcome in the one whose

life we hardly understand. Not to change them, not to make them like us, or us like them. We are to love the unique aspects of all God's people. Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
