May God bless our understanding of this, God's holy word. **The word of the Lord.**

Message

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

How much do we remember and forget? Remembering and forgetting has been studied with a significant amount of research focussed on memory. You are likely aware that when we are exposed to new information and do <u>not</u> put an effort into recall ... that information will likely slip away. And, it slips away rather quickly. Research indicates that within one hour, people forget about 50% of new information. Within 24 hours, that goes to about 70%, and by the end of a week about 90% will be gone. A neuroscientist will explain that forgetting is a natural, adaptive, and desirable activity. According to research from Dr. Art Kohn it is what you do after learning new material that can help to hold the information.

When I moved a couple of years ago, a lot of time was spent sorting and purging within the home where I lived for 21 years and raised three children. Many things were given away in an effort to reduce. Over the last few years I have searched my memory and my current home for several of the items. Quite often I could picture it in my previous home. Sometimes, I was successful in the search – both memory and for the item. Other times I

concluded the item was long gone as part of the purge. There are times when our brain discards information. In a sense, the brain is purging the memories that are no longer relevant. Problems can arise when our brains get rid of important information.

There are many types of memory. When many of us were in elementary school the schools taught by rote ... learning by repetition. Think of the poem, Flanders Fields, as an example of learning this way. One of the ways in which we continue to remember is through repeatedly doing the same thing. It is helpful in cooking... cook the same recipe over and over and eventually it will become anchored in your memory. With a lot of practice and the use of cue cards on key chains I was able to learn ancient Greek in seminary.

Another form of memory is Anamnesis [a·nuhm·nee·suhs]. Anamnesis in medical terms refers to a review of the entire case history. In faith Anamnesis is a deep remembering of God's Salvation history. In our TANAKH reading, Joshua called the community leaders to the ancient shrine of Shechem on the Jordan. Joshua was speaking to "the elders, the heads, the judges and the officers of Israel" and urging them to recall the history of their relationship with God. He encouraged and challenged them to remember God and their ancestors.

We need that reminder, particularly when life seems unstable. We need to remind ourselves and others that God is present. When times get tough ... God never gives up. We need reminders that God is present in our lives and the life of creation.

Joshua gathered the people to remind them of who they were, who they belonged to, and how they got there. He called them to remember what God had done and what God was continuing to do. Joshua challenged them to recommit their lives when he said, "Choose this day whom you will serve."

The parable also asks us to choose whom we will serve as it reminds us to watch, wait, and be prepared. People were growing impatient for Jesus to return when Matthew wrote the gospel. Over the last two thousand years people have continued to grow impatient. We continue to wait, sometimes impatiently, sometimes in a distracted manner. We are distracted by worldly things such as pursuing careers and enjoying retirement without thought of having Christ as structure in our everyday lives.

We hold the promise of his return, yet, that may slip on our priority list. We may fall into a kind of slumber, like the bridesmaids. While studying the passage I wondered how each of us might describe our sleep. Do you have good sleep hygiene...going to bed with a routine that allows you to sleep soundly? Do we prepare the evening ahead for the next morning? The parable described the foolish women sleeping without preparation. The wise women had carefully prepared by filling their lamps. They were ready, with nothing left to do but wait.

How can we understand this parable? Perhaps the filled lamps represent faith. We must care for our faith with the nurturing nature of prayer that allows us to be in connection with God. The love of Christ that guides us to serve one another and our neighbors. The study of scripture, the singing of hymns. Our memories are enriched and enhanced by the sense of connection within our faith practices, rituals, and traditions.

Jesus promised to return with love and compassion; filled with grace. Steve Molin shared, "He comes looking for the flames that flicker in the lives of those who wait."

In the midst of this challenging time with major wars, rising interest rates, increased housing costs, financial instability, the impact of COVID, and other factors many are struggling. Since the start of COVID, there has been a significant increase in the number of people suffering from anxiety and depression. This has been exasperated with several factors. People are suffering from loss, grief, and anxiety; from overwork, lack of financial stability, worries about the future; and, a lack of emotional and spiritual support. People are struggling with being overwhelmed and a sense of emptiness, many are exhausted, and they do not know where to turn. Life is experienced as chaotic and without a sound structure.

Many search for meaning as they yearn for a passionate life, a life worth living with authenticity, truth, identity, and meaning. This full life is found in our relationship with God. In this relationship you are offered his unconditional love for you as a beloved child of God. In this relationship we are equipped with the structure to be in relationship with one another.

Lori Wagner wrote, "Our relationship with God, says Jesus, is one of emotional and spiritual intimacy, filled with joy and abundance ... Our faith is our only fuel. He will do the

rest. ... All we need to do is "be ready" –be faithful, look for him, pray to him, believe in him."

It is important to hear and remember this message of love and encouragement. We need to hear it regularly in diverse ways. We need to anchor it in our memory and live it out in our daily lives. This message of love and hope encourages us to spend time each day in prayer, opening our hearts, minds, and spirits to God.

In closing, theologian Frederick Buechner wrote, "Hope stands up to its knees in the past and keeps its eyes on the future. There has never been a time past when God wasn't with us as the strength beyond our strength, the wisdom beyond our wisdom. To remember the past is to see that we are here today by grace, that we have survived as a gift." Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
