Message

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

Today is Pentecost Sunday. This marks the beginning of the 'ordinary time' of the church seasons. The term Ordinary Time in our liturgical calendar sets it apart from Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. During this time there is a focus on the teachings and ministry of Jesus. Within our church tradition Pentecost follows the season that began with Ash Wednesday and flowed through Lent into Holy Week and then concluded with the Sundays of Easter. It is an annual journey that moves symbolically from ashes to fire. Pentecost helps us to better understand that the church exists to proclaim the love and grace of the triune God.

The scripture readings this morning speak of times of major transitions. The prophet Ezekial is speaking to the people of Judah who had been exiled to foreign lands. In the book of Acts and gospel of John the disciples are in the tumultuous time during and after Christ's physical presence among them. These stories provide rich imagery of rushing wind with the many voices of Pentecost and the re-animation of hope as dry bones come to life. The re-birth of hope and faith with the Spirit of Truth as guide.

In the book of Acts, the physician Luke wrote about the disciples gathering to celebrate Pentecost, Shavuot as it is known in the Jewish tradition. Shavuot is a festival that happens fifty days after Passover to celebrate Moses receiving the Torah from God. The Prepared for Knox Presbyterian Church, Box 565, Bayfield, ON NOM 1G0

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Jewish people had gathered from many places to celebrate and as they gathered many languages were spoken.

There is a rabbinic tradition that shares the giving of the Ten Commandments. There was a single sound, yet when that sound went out ... it divided into seven voices and then seventy , so that everyone received the law in their own language. The law was meant to share the will of God. In giving the Spirit on Pentecost, the church received God's Spirit to guide the people. The Spirit is intended for all... to unite us with prophecies, visions, and dreams. ..united in diversity...the diversity of age, gender, and social status ...united by the great outpouring of the Spirit.

Christians celebrate Pentecost fifty days after Easter Sunday; fifty days after the resurrection. We celebrate the arrival of the Spirit. Pentecost is the reversal of the effects of the tower of Babel, when the languages of the world were "confused" and people were scattered. The people who gathered on this day learned of the life and teachings of Jesus with the disciples speaking in the listeners language as the Spirit moved them.

When God's Spirit called the ancient prophets to boldly speak, it was into dangerous situations. Ezekiel saw a vision of God's Spirit blowing through a valley of dry bones and bringing them to life.

Mickey Anders speaks to the imagery of the Spirit, which is often depicted as a gentle dove. Anders wrote, "Celtic Christians chose, not the dove, but the wild goose as a symbol representing the Holy Spirit. It sounds strange to us, but it has a long tradition in Ireland. While the Roman Church imagined the Holy Spirit in the form of a peaceful, graceful dove, the Ancient Celts understood the Holy Spirit to be like a wild goose." The wild goose in Ireland includes the Canada goose along with several other varieties. Consider how this might shift your understanding of the Holy Spirit. Doves cooing are very different from geese honking. I cannot recall a dove chasing people or other creatures through a park. Most of us are aware that geese can be loud and aggressive. Anders continued, "When you hear of the Spirit descending like a heavenly dove on you, you hear harps and strings softly playing and get a peaceful feeling. ... The image of a wild goose descending upon you is a different matter altogether. A wild goose is one noisy, bothersome bird. I like this image of the Holy Spirit as a wild goose because it jars us out of our complacency." Pentecost urges us to be mindful of the events that marked the early church.

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Each year during Pentecost I am reminded of walking in Hebron, a Palestinian city in the southern West Bank, 30 kilometres south of Jerusalem. In the fall of 2014 I travelled with a small group in a Presbyterian Church study tour in the Middle East. During the tour of Hebron, the guides from the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel (EAPPI – pronounced "yappie") walked with us. While I watched a group of children passing through a checkpoint controlled by the Israeli military, young men and women armed with automatic guns I listened to the advocates. They shared stories of their work in Palestine. This organization offers a vital demonstration of God's love in the world. EAPPI, coordinated by the World Council of Churches, is a mission effort supported in part by the PCC. It was developed when Churches in Jerusalem identified the need to bring an international presence to the West Bank. Their vision is a future when the Palestinian occupation has ended, a future where Palestinians and Israelis enjoy a just peace with freedom and security based on international law.

Their mission is to witness life under occupation; to engage with local people pursuing peace; to change the international community's involvement in the conflict; and to urge others to take action against injustice in the region. They have a core set of values of love, truth, justice, peace, and reconciliation. EAPPI is a response of the global Church to the call of the local Church.

During the escalation in Gaza, the advocates were evacuated. "While prioritizing safety and carefully assessing risks, the WCC is gradually resuming in-person involvement by accompaniers. The return of accompaniers is coupled with continued vigilance. ...

Jerusalem is the primary location for the physical presence of ecumenical accompaniers." Their goal is to walk with the Palestinians, live directly with the local community, and work with local and international organizations. Their placement allows them to experience life under occupation. EAPPI advocates for change when they help to focus global attention on the situation. It is a biblical model for acting justly by following in the ways of Christ. The volunteers gather from around the world, from many cultures, with many languages. They seek to understand the truth and then share the truth of their experience when they return to their communities.

We live in challenging times that are filled with distractions. It takes some effort to develop the practice of being in prayer, in seeking God's direction for our daily lives.

Consider setting time aside to meditate ... to pray ... to breathe into the ways in which the Prepared for Knox Presbyterian Church, Box 565, Bayfield, ON NOM 1G0

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Spirit is guiding you and this congregation. Gerry Pierse shared an interesting perspective. He wrote, "Those who say that meditation is an escape from reality obviously have no experience of it. Because if they had this experience they would know that meditation makes us face honestly the reality that is at our own core and it gives us insight into the core of that reality. This, I think, is another way of saying that it puts us in touch with the Spirit. In a sense, then, each time we put on our spiritual snorkels and set out to meditate we are celebrating Pentecost, the presence of the Holy Spirit in our midst."

As you meditate, consider reflecting on the ways in which we collectively proclaim the love and grace of the triune God. Consider the ways in which you find the Spirit guiding you. Be attentive to the peaceful presence of the dove and the barking demands of the goose. Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
