## Message

O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

Don M. Aycock wrote, "Some searches take people to unexpected places and give surprising results. For example, Columbus searched for a new route to Asia and found America instead. Louis Pasteur tried to find a way to keep wine from souring and came up with the pasteurization process instead. Alexander Graham Bell wanted to improve the telegraph but wound up with the telephone. Roentgen worked to find a better light for photography but invented the X-ray instead. Sometimes we do not find what we are

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searching for. ... Apparently not satisfied with one miracle, the people set off in search of Jesus. They were searching for ongoing food and discovered salvation."

We just read in John's gospel, Jesus said to them, "Very truly I tell you, it is not Moses who has given you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is the bread that comes down from heaven and gives life to the world."

"Sir," they said, "always give us this bread."

Then Jesus declared, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. "

It seems that hunger and thirst within our world is unquenchable. The endless pursuit for wealth that seems to lead to corruption and exploitation is alarming. It seems the tent cities grow as the profits of corporations are reported in billions. Not so long ago, that statement would have been heard as an exaggeration.

A while ago I was looking for information about nutrition and healthy eating patterns. In my research, I came across an article titled, 'How the 'food' we eat causes harm by not really being food at all' by Chris VanTulleken, an infectious diseases doctor and professor. This intriguing article describes the ways in which changes over the last 150 years or so created foods that are harmful. He notes that ultra-processed foods -UPF'sare complicated, however, the UPF can be basically understood as: " If it's wrapped in plastic and contains an ingredient you don't find in a typical home kitchen, then it's a UPF. Much of it will be familiar to you as "junk food," but there's plenty that's also sold as healthy, nutritious, environmentally friendly or useful for weight loss. It's another rule of thumb that almost every food that comes with a health claim on the packet is a UPF." If you are thinking of pop, packaged snacks, and quick cook meals – you are correct. However, you will also need to include grocery store breads and cereals, and processed meat products.

He describes the changes in breads. Not only does it keep for a very long time, it is also softer- which makes it easier to over-eat. In this article he suggests a simple solution. "One neat trick to alleviate the hold UPFs have over your brain is to eat while you read, which is similar to a well-evidenced approach to guitting smoking: Eat a UPF product and

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try to enjoy it as you read the ingredients. As you drink, think about the phosphoric acid in your cola, leeching the minerals out of your bones. As you chew, think of the Xanthan gum in your ice cream, promoting the growth of novel bacteria in your gut. Many people have found that they simply stop wanting the food." The article ends with, "When people realize what healthy food actually is – and that they can't afford to eat it – that's when the revolution begins."

Scriptures encourage us to recognize the ways in which we are called to live out our faith within in our communities. There are stories of the complex lives lived by many people. The stories help us to understand the ways in which we are to scratch at the surface of our understanding and knowledge to discover the true source of life. We are encouraged to look beyond the immediate information in order to comprehend the source. It was not Moses who provided the manna in the desert. It was not Moses who saved them from oppression and slavery in Egypt. It was God, leading, providing, and encouraging them along the way. It was not the boys lunch that fed thousands, it was the power of God's abundance through Jesus. When we remember the source we begin to recognize our part in the complex relationships within creation.

Jesus teaches that when genuine love takes hold then a community of hope is born. With love, imaginations are sparked. Jesus offers his assurance that the love he offers is nothing less than God's love. In the time of the gospels, people struggled to grasp if the power that Jesus embodied was more real—more truthful—than the oppression and humiliation of Roman rule. Jesus declared that this love was known to him as he was one with God. There is a circular quality to these words spoken by Jesus. "If you love me, you will obey my commands." The most important of these commands being to love God, self, and neighbour. This is a message that many of you have been nurtured with for your entire lives. For some, this is a new way of seeing. It can be particularly difficult to take in a different way of seeing, to shift into a different perspective. Transforming experiences can occur when this shift in perspective occurs. Take a moment to reflect on this by saying, "God loves me. I am a beloved child of God." Allow this message to settle within you.

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Jesus tells us that God's love is true and that God's love is the source of abundant life. It may seem rather simple but it can be one of the most difficult aspects to grasp. There are many, too many, people who struggle to love themselves, let alone others. Some struggle to love God. Many struggle to love their neighbours, especially those who hold different world views or perspectives. It can be challenging to love people who have caused harm to us or to others. Yet, it is possible. Nelson Mandela, the South African anti-apartheid revolutionary, political leader, and philanthropist wrote, "No one is born hating another person because of the colour of his skin, his background, or his religion. People must learn to hate, and if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love, for love comes more naturally to the human heart than its opposite."

Throughout the stories within the scriptures, Jesus lives within community with his disciples and others. These real people who struggled to understand his teachings and who struggled to get along with one another. Their stories, their hopes, and their struggles are shared and we can learn from them. In a similar way, in order to understand what others are telling us in our lives, it is important to be in relationship where we can seek an understanding of what is meant by our words and our actions. In relationship we develop an awareness of the context of our own lives and others. We are urged to look beyond the superficial, to dig deeper into our connections with one another within this premise of abundant love.

Jesus was well aware of the fears and concerns of the people, then and now. When we follow in his teachings we develop resiliency and discover the abundance God provides. Seek the spiritual depth promised by Christ as you discern the presence of God in your life. Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
