Message

Guide us by your Word and Spirit this day, so that we may gain wisdom from the Scriptures, and be moved to follow Jesus more close for he is your Living Word. O holy One, by the power of your Holy Spirit at work in the word read and proclaimed, may the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you. Amen.

When we are nurtured in a faithful community, the roots of our common faith grow deep in its rich soil. It is vital to seek an understanding of the many ways in which the teachings of Christ impact our lives. Poet Maya Angelou shares the ways in which her faith was formed, including memories of her grandmother: her wisdom, her stature and her faith. She recalled her grandmother would clasp her hands behind her back, look up into the distant sky and say, "I will step out on the word of God." 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difficult time for everyone, but "especially so for a single black woman in the South tending her crippled son and two grandchildren." When her grandmother was dealing with mountainous burdens, she would face the sky and say, "I will step out on the word of God." And she would look up as if she could will herself into the heavens". Maya grew up knowing that the word of God had power. Whenever she experiences the injustices of this world, Maya remembers the great faith of her grandmother. God gives us spiritual armor to protect us from the evil we face: God provides us with truth, righteousness, the willingness to speak up for Christ, and, most importantly, faith.

When we are nurtured in a faithful community, the roots of our common faith grow deep. It is vital to seek an understanding of the many ways in which the teachings of Christ are counter-cultural. It is necessary to wrestle with the stories to uncover the deeper teachings. The imagery in the readings today may be disturbing, at the very least - confusing. Paul wrote to the Ephesians about the armour of Christ as an important part of the Christian identity. It does not make sense to imagine Christ with military armour. The armor of Christ speaks to the necessity of unmasking that which is against the goodness of God's creation. Digging into the truth of situations, exposing the harm done through the use of violence to control and oppress. The harm done by fatalism, addiction, genocide, isolation, hunger, racism, and human trafficking. When we put on the armour of Christ and follow in his teachings we see the world more clearly.

John Ortberg shared an incident involving Desmon Tutu when a political rally opposed to apartheid was cancelled by the South African government. Desmond Tutu led a worship service in St. George's Cathedral. The walls were lined with soldiers and riot police carrying guns and bayonets, ready to close it down. Bishop Tutu began to speak of the evils of the apartheid system -- how the rulers and authorities that propped it up were doomed to fail. He pointed a finger at the police who were there to record his words: "You may be powerful -- very powerful -- but you are not God. God cannot be mocked. You have already lost." Then, in a moment of unbearable tension, the bishop seemed to soften. Coming out from behind the pulpit, he flashed that radiant Tutu smile and began to bounce up and down with glee. "Therefore, since you have already lost, we are inviting you to join the winning side." The crowd roared, the police melted away and the people began to dance. Don't go away, the apostle Paul says. Put on your armor and dance. I am inviting you to join the winning side."

The imagery in the gospel of John confused the disciples and they responded with, "This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?" Jesus taught that "The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life." The bread that he offered was greater than the manna that sustained their ancestors in the desert. The bread that he offers will provide eternal life. This passage brings to mind the story of the Samaritan woman at the well where Jesus said, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty." Jesus used familiar symbols of bread, wine, flesh, blood, and water to help us to grasp this gift of life. He is speaking of eternal life—not immortality. Eternal life allows us to resist the fear of death as we discover a life worth living with purpose and joy.

William Willimon wrote "The reason this passage is so tough is that we are modern people who live in flattened, cause-effect worlds full of data and facts. We simply may not have the intellectual imagination to deal with words and images like those Jesus serves up today." Thomas Yorty commented, "Willimon is on to something. We do live in a flattened 9 to 5 world. Force life into bite sized data, facts, time-frames. Translate our joy and sorrow into tidy cause and effect formulas. When something terrible happens how often have you heard someone say or said yourself, there must be a reason. Being able to clutch onto reasons gives us the illusion of control, security, and power. " Fear may be a barrier that prevents us from grasping that Christ provides the gifts of spirit and life. Fear can be powerful. When life becomes chaotic, when circumstances seem to spin out of control, when we are overwhelmed, many seek a sense of control. It is in those moments that control can actually be relinquished. In the moments that we choose to abide in Christ and he in us—we give up the notion that we are in control. Fear will dissipate and no longer have any power. We turn our concerns over to God, trusting that we are loved and cared for. We can accept the love of God then the Spirit is able to flow from us and through us.

In our faith we gather, in part, to recognize and acknowledge the importance of being in community. Each of you as individuals are strengthened by your willingness to be part of this community. This congregation gathers to build up their relationships with God and with one another. In following the ways and teachings of Christ, you are nurtured within God's creation. Your efforts to help others in the world are magnified and strengthened - together.

In closing, Charles Leary shared an interesting story. A church member, Alex, had been active for many years and recently stopped attending. One cold winter evening the pastor knocked at his door. As they watched the wood burn in the fireplace, the minister mentioned the man's absence from church. Alex confessed that he had decided he was just as well off without the church as with it. The minister didn't say a word. He took the fire tongs from the rack, reached into the fire, pulled out a flaming ember, and laid it down by itself on the hearth. Both men sat in silence and watched the single glowing ember lose its glow and turn slowly into a crusty, black lump. After some moments of thoughtful silence, Alex turned to his pastor and said, "I get the message, my friend, I see what you mean; I'll be back next Sunday." And he was.

Praise be to God for visions and the movement of the Spirit among us.
